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### **Social Equity Criteria Data Point Primer**

This Primer is intended to assist applicants for the Social Equity Criteria Lottery, a new application and lottery process pursuant to 68 IAC 1291. 400, available [here](#). For more information on this application and lottery process, please review the Department's [Social Equity Criteria Lottery Steps](#) and [Acceptable Documents Guide](#).

In order to be issued a conditional license pursuant to this application process, a top participant<sup>1</sup> must prove, amongst all other statutory requirements<sup>2</sup> and limitations<sup>3</sup>, that it is 51% or more owned or controlled by one or more individuals who each meet the combination of at least one of the criteria under Criteria A and one of the criteria under Criteria B. This does not mean multiple individuals need to meet identical criteria, but each individual accounting for the 51% or more ownership must individually meet at least one criterion from Criteria A and one criterion from Criteria B. In other words, if there are 3 proposed individuals that collectively make up 51% of the ownership of a top participant entity, Individual 1 needs to meet 1 criterion from Criteria A and 1 criterion from Criteria B, Individual 2 needs to meet 1 criterion from Criteria A and 1 criterion from Criteria B, and Individual 3 needs to meet 1 criterion from Criteria A and 1 criterion from Criteria B.

In order to be eligible for a conditional license in the above scenario, the top participant must prove to the Department for each individual making up 51% ownership:

<sup>3</sup> Pursuant to 410 ILCS 705/15-30(k), no single person or entity may have a direct or indirect financial interest in more than 10 Early Approval Adult Use Dispensing Organization Licenses, Conditional Adult Use Dispensing Organization Licenses, or Adult Use Dispensing Organization Licenses. Any entity that is awarded a conditional license that results in a single person or entity having a direct or indirect financial interest in more than 10 licenses shall forfeit the most recently issued license and suffer a penalty to be determined by the Department in accordance with section 15-145 of the Act, unless the entity declines the license at the time it is awarded. 68 IAC 1291.420(n). Pursuant to 68 IAC 1291.95(a), if the Illinois Department of Revenue determines a principal officer is not compliant, the Department will notify the principal officer via e-mail and the principal officer will have 60 days to provide proof of compliance from the Illinois Department of Revenue or the applicant will be denied the Conditional License and the next drawn applicant from the lottery will be notified of its eligibility for a Conditional License. The Department must deny all of the applicant entity's Conditional Licenses if one or more principal officers is unable to come into compliance within the timeframe provided in 68 IAC 1291.95(c). In addition to those listed, the Department may deny an applicant's Conditional License for any other reason allowed by law.

1. The individual’s home address is within the eligible census tract in Criteria A;
2. The individual resided at the home address for a total of 5 of the past 10 years; (see [Social Equity Criteria Acceptable Documents Guide](#) to prove residency); and
3. The individual qualifies under one of Criteria B’s requirements.

An individual can prove eligibility with multiple addresses in multiple census tracts for 5 of the past 10 years, so long as each census tract is eligible under one of Criteria A’s options. In other words, an individual is not require to have lived at the same address for all 5 years, but if there are multiple addresses, each must qualify in the appropriate census tract. Further, an individual address’ census tract qualifies if the locations *currently* meet the eligibility criteria (e.g., a person lived from 2015-2020 at an address in a census tract qualifying using the 2021 Census Bureau 5-year surveys).

Remember, if a top participant has multiple individuals who make up the 51% ownership or control of the entity, the top participant needs to prove the above three bullet points for each individual.

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## Criteria A and Criteria B

### Criteria A

See 68 IAC 1291.410(e)(6)(A)

- i) An individual who has resided for at least 5 of the preceding 10 years in a census tract that has a poverty rate of at least 20% according to the latest 5-year American Community Survey (Table S1701: Poverty Status in the Past 12 Months) that is publicly available at the start of the application submission window for the lottery conducted under Sections 1291.400 through 1291.440. The data set is available at <https://data.census.gov/cedsci/table?q=poverty%20rate&g=0100000US%241400000&tid=ACST5Y2020.S1701>;
- NOTE: The link above is from the 2020 5-year American Community Survey. The rules require the most recent 5-year survey, which was recently updated by the Census Bureau to reflect 2021 instead of 2020.** Therefore, all applicants must use the 2021 survey. Please follow the directions below on page 5, **particularly Step 3**, for selecting the 2021 5-year ACS Survey. The result should be this data:

- ii) An individual who has resided for at least 5 of the preceding 10 years in a census tract where at least 20% of the households receive assistance under the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program in the latest 5-year American Community Survey (Table S2201: Food Stamps/Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)) that is publicly available at the start of the application submission window for the lottery conducted under Sections 1291.400 through 1291.440. The data set is available at <https://data.census.gov/cedsci/table?q=snap%20participation&g=0100000US%241400000&tid=ACSS5Y2020.S2201>;
- NOTE: The link above is from the 2020 5-year American Community Survey. The rules require the most recent 5-year survey, which was recently updated by the Census Bureau to reflect 2021 instead of 2020.** Please follow the directions below on page 7, **particularly Step 3**, for selecting the 2021 5-year ACS Survey. - iii) An individual who has resided for at least 5 of the preceding 10 years in a census tract area classified as "low income and low access" where at least 100 households are more than one-half mile from the nearest supermarket and have no access to a vehicle or a significant number (at least 500 people) or share (at least 33%) of the population is greater than 1 mile from the nearest supermarket, supercenter, or large grocery store for an urban area or greater than 20 miles for a rural area, as classified by the latest United States Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service's Food Access Research Atlas data set that is publicly available at the start of the application submission window for the lottery conducted under Sections 1291.400 through 1291.440. The data set is available at the United States Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service's Food Access Research Atlas, is available at <https://www.ers.usda.gov/data-products/food-access-research-atlas/go-to-the-atlas>;
- iv) An individual who has received Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income, Social Security Disability, and/or subsidized housing for at least 5 of the preceding 10 years; and/or,

- v) An individual who has resided for at least 5 of the preceding 10 years in a census tract in the top 15<sup>th</sup> percentile for the percent of residents in the census tract failing to graduate from High School in that state, as classified by the latest 5-year American Community Survey (Table S1501: Educational Attainment) that is publicly available at the start of the application submission window for the lottery conducted under Sections 1291.400 through 1291.440. #### **Criteria B**

**See 68 IAC 1291.410(e)(6)(B)**

- i) An individual who has been arrested for, convicted of, or adjudicated delinquent for any offense, or substantially similar offense, of Illinois, federal or other state law for:
- possession of not more than 500 grams of cannabis; or
  - manufacture, delivery, or possession with intent to deliver, or manufacture of cannabis up to 30 grams;
- ii) An individual who has a family member who has been arrested for, convicted of, or adjudicated delinquent for any offense, or substantially similar offense, of Illinois, federal, or other state law for:
- possession of not more than 500 grams of cannabis; or
  - manufacture, delivery, or possession with intent to deliver, or manufacture or cannabis up to 30 grams.
- iii) An individual who has been a victim of firearm injury, as those terms are defined in this Part. This must be evidenced by either a police report or medical record.

A top participant must demonstrate its majority owners meet at least one option from Criteria A and one option from Criteria B to qualify as a Social Equity Applicant under this new process. Four of the five Criteria A options (i, ii, iii, and v) require an individual to have lived for five of the preceding ten years in a qualifying census tract. Census Tracts are the geographic regions tracked by the U.S. Census Bureau with usually about 4,000 inhabitants. They are redrawn after every decennial census and the Census Bureau includes many demographic and socio-economic measures by census tract.

Criteria A(i), A(ii), and A(v) use the American Community Survey, a detailed survey by the U.S. Census Bureau that covers the entire country. The criteria use five-year surveys—data is collected over five years to provide the most precise and detailed estimates even for areas with low populations—for poverty rates of 20% or more of the census tract (Criteria A(i)), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program of 20% or more

of the tract (Criteria A(ii)), high school attainment in the bottom 15% of the state of the census tract (Criteria A(v)). The bullets below explain how to use each Census dataset.

Criteria A(iii) uses the U.S. Department of Agriculture Economic Research Service's Food Access Research Atlas, a research project to identify areas of limited food access. Criteria A(iii) identifies "low income and low access" areas where at least 100 households are more than one-half mile from the nearest supermarket and have no access to a vehicle or a significant number (at least 500 people) or share (at least 33%) of the population is greater than 1 mile from the nearest supermarket, supercenter, or large grocery store for an urban area or greater than 20 miles for a rural area.

## **Criteria A Interactive Map**

This [interactive map](#) allows individuals to check if an individual address is within a census tract that qualifies for one of the required social equity criteria. The Department encourages all individuals to utilize this helpful map as they prepare their applications.

The map combines the most recent data from the 5-year American Community Survey (ACS) and the USDA's Economic Research Service's Food Access Research Atlas.<sup>4</sup>

To use the map:

- Type in an address or city in the upper lefthand corner to zoom into a specific location.

If you do not know the address, use one of these search methods:

- Click the search box and type in an address or choose **Use current location**
- Click within the map using the plus "+" or minus "-" buttons to zoom in/out or the home button
- Use the blue "**Clear search location**" to select another location or reset the map

The information box will display whether the location meets one of the Social Equity Criteria.

- If the "**Social Equity Criteria Eligibility Result(s)**" displays a "**1**," the location meets that criteria
- If the "**Social Equity Criteria Eligibility Result(s)**" displays a "**0**," the location does not meet that criteria
- If no social equity criteria options are met, a warning bar will appear saying "**The address entered does not fall within any criteria**"

While the interactive map is meant to serve as a helpful resource, it should not be interpreted as legal advice or as a legal conclusion. Applicants may wish to confirm the information by checking their census tract for themselves following the directions for Criteria A below. Should an applicant be selected as a top participant in the Social Equity Criteria Lottery, the Department will confirm that the applicant's address(es) meet the criteria.

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<sup>4</sup> As of January 12, 2023, the 2021 5-year American Community Survey was the most recent and used for Criteria A(i), A(ii), and A(v). The USDA's 2019 Food Access Research Atlas was the most recent and used for Criteria A(iii).

- **Police reports and arrest records** will be held by the police department that performed the arrest.
  - To obtain a copy, contact the arresting police department's records division and ask how to obtain a copy of the police report and any arrest records.
  - If you are unsure of which police department performed the arrest, you may wish to contact a public aid attorney to assist you in obtaining a criminal background.
  - All copies of records should be saved as PDF documents.
- **Records of convictions** can be obtained from the clerk of the court in the county you were convicted in.
  - To obtain a copy, you can either call the courthouse in the county you were convicted in or visit the courthouse in person and request the clerk of the court's office.
  - If you are unsure of which county you were convicted in, you may wish to contact a legal aid attorney to assist you in obtaining a criminal background.
  - All copies of records should be saved PDF documents.
- For **Pardons and Expungements**, applicants will need to provide evidence of a pardon or expungement, either state or federal.
  - All copies of records should be saved PDF documents.
- **Medical records** can be obtained from the hospital or healthcare provider who treated you
  - To obtain copies, contact the hospital or healthcare provider's records department and ask about obtaining copies.
  - If you are unsure of which hospital or healthcare provider treated you, you may wish to contact your primary care provider for assistance in determining your healthcare history.
  - All copies of records should saved as PDF documents.
